

## Introduction

CASLO XXIV was to be held in Fredericton, NB. A first for CASLO: ASL in the Maritimes. And then COVID-19 reared its ugly head and the global pandemic put a stop to many things, including CASLO XXIV. The tournament director, David Garvin, approached the committee and proposed an emergency CASLA session and the membership voted on a Virtual CASLO in its place. It was, in a word, a resounding success.

Hosted by the nascent Fredericton-based ASL Club (“D-Day Dodgers ASL Club of Southern New Brunswick”), Virtual CASLO became the club’s newest focus. With under a month to go, the planning committee altered the scenario list ever so slightly due to lack of VASL maps for certain scenarios. With that, VASL version 6.5.0 start files were created and these were sent out to the tournament participants, along with scenario packs. In all, 40 players logged in from across Canada and around the globe, from Sweden to New Zealand!

## The Tournament

Modern problems require modern solutions. As such, the opening ceremonies were conducted using Zoom. Most participants were able to partake and many brought along their own cheer to toast the memory of Jim McLeod. The Tournament director, David Garvin, read a small note about Jim, courtesy of Dr Mark Pitcavage’s well-known site, Desperationmorale.com:

*Perhaps over a 100,000 people own a copy of ASL, and the number of people who play at least semi-regularly numbers in the tens of thousands. But the number of “hardcore” ASL players is far smaller and the “hardcore” ASL scene—the scene with clubs dedicated to the game, and tournaments, and people dedicated enough to read these words—is not that large. That scene depends on key movers and shakers to keep it going. They are the ones who design scenarios, host tournaments, publish newsletters, run websites. Among this sort of people, Jim McLeod loomed large.*

The tournament had two components: the main tournament of five rounds and several mini tournaments of three rounds each. The mini tournaments were conducted in a round-robin fashion with four players in each. Some were those who slotted over from the main tournament after the second round, but most were signed up just for them.

### The Main Tournament

Each round had a theme and had five scenarios from which to choose. Players were asked to submit their scenario and side choices ahead of time to facilitate matching. The first round's theme was East Front Heavy Metal. The following were the scenarios:

NB: Strayer's Strays was played by request due to a new player not being familiar with AFVs. His opponent graciously agreed. And lost as the Germans. How nice!

Round 2's theme was From the Official Publishers. This had five scenarios from Avalon Hill and Multiman Publishing. Unfortunately, one player had to withdraw from the main tournament after the first round as he took ill. The following were the scenarios:

Round 3 started on Saturday and with it was the round featuring Canadians in O Canada. As mentioned, a number of players reverted to the minis for the final two days. Of note, 2 scenarios featured actions of the local reserve regiment, the Carleton and York Regiment, perpetuated today by the Royal New Brunswick Regiment of the Canadian Army. As well, a Jim McLeod scenario was featured. The following were the scenarios

The next round on Saturday was Early War Blitzkrieg. The early war battles as Germany and Japan rapidly expanded their territories against a growing number of enemy nation-states was the focus. The scenarios were:

Once Sunday came around, only two undefeated players remained: Carl Nogueira and Darren Kovacs. Both are great players and well-known across the ASL community. The winner would emerge as CASLO XXIV Champion. They ended up playing in J 43, 3<sup>rd</sup> RTR in the Rain. Carl had it (with Germans) as his first choice; Darren had it as it second choice, no preference. Second place was still up in the air as several players went into round 5 with a 3-1 record. With some of them getting to 4-1, thus matching the loser of the above-mentioned match, it was a matter of bonus points to settle 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> place. The theme was Case Yellow, featuring the German drive into the low countries and France in 1940 (with a special appearance of Japanese attacking the French!) The scenarios were:

### Random Statistics

- The scenario most often chosen by the players was J 43 3<sup>rd</sup> RTR in the Rain with 28 players selecting it as one of their choices in the 5<sup>th</sup> round of the main tournament.
- The most popular individual choice was J 175 Bedburg Bite as Germans, chosen by an amazing 20 players in the 3<sup>rd</sup> round.
- The top #1 pick was RPT 3 Varosmajor Grange with 9 people taking it as their top pick in the first round.
- The top #2 pick was J 175 Bedburg Bite as German, selected by 9 players in the 3<sup>rd</sup> round.
- The top #3 pick was FT 91 Ne Pas Subir as German, selected by an astounding 13 players in the 5<sup>th</sup> round.

### Final Thoughts

As tournament director, my job was made easy because of the players. There was only one adjudication and this was due to time running out. There were no complaints whatsoever but there were also a number of compliments on opponents. “So-and-so was a great player and he should have won this. I will play him anytime!” is a paraphrasing by me, but it’s not far off the mark.

I have to thank the CASLA committee for their advice in the planning phases of this tournament, especially as we transited to a virtual tournament.

Next, my thanks to the tournament committee. Andrew Luden selected the majority of the main tournament scenarios. Christian Knudsen worked on the Mini Tournament scenarios with Andrew, as well as provided timely feedback on the selections. Notably was the behind-the-scenes work of novice ASL player Nick Faryna. He played his first match against me on September 16<sup>th</sup>: Retaking Vierville. His first full-rules ASL Match was on October 14<sup>th</sup> as he and I fought it out as the Guards counterattacked in ASL A. He did all the VASL maps for the

tournament, both main and all the minis. Without these three gentlemen doing such great work, Virtual CASLO XXIV would not have been held at all.

Finally, I must thank my first ASL Mentor, Alain Chabot. When I stumbled across the ASL Starter Kit six years ago, he played S 20 Joseph 351 against me on the 12<sup>th</sup> of March 2014. I had played the old game system before that, but S 20 was an eye opener for me, even though it was “only” starter kit! Several hundred matches later, I cannot thank him enough.
